The Truth About Sin

1 John 1:8-10, 2:1-2

I. <u>Introduction:</u>

A. Interview

- **1.** <u>Story:</u> 22 year old young man was interviewed by a health care worker to be tested for Aids& for other venereal diseases he may have contracted due to a promiscuous lifestyle.
- 2. Application: Interestingly, he had no recognition of sin or acknowledgement of wrong.
- 3. Our Passage: In our passage this morning John deals with man's errant view of sin.
- **4.** This errant view of sin is unfortunately found even among Christians.

II. If we say we have no sin (1 John 1:8-10)

A. Two primary ways a person denies sin.

- 1. They deny they have committed sin.
 - **a.** Many people think of sin as something that gets the headlines such as:
 - Murder, Adultery, Child abuse, Embezzlement, or Bank robbery.
 - **b.** Since the person hasn't committed any of the things they consider "bad" they do not think they have sinned.
 - c. Problem: This view of sin falls short of what sin actually is.
 - **d.** The word for sin is *hamartia* which literally means to miss the mark.
 - e. Sin is at its core a failure to be perfect as God is perfect. (Romans 3:23)

2. – Not responsible

- **a.** The 2nd way people deny sin is to deny responsibility by shifting personal guilt to someone or something else. Concerning sin, people deny responsibility with excuses:
 - (1) It's just the way I was raised. (2) It's just the way my culture is.
 - (3) It's just the way I am. (4) It's my social environment.
 - (5) It's my economic disadvantage. (6) It's my educational disadvantage.
- **b.** It is human nature to blame someone else for our sin and wrong choices.
- c. Problem: To deny our responsibility for our sin is to deceive ourselves. (1 John 1:8)
- **d.** Fundamental 1st step of salvation is willingness to admit & confess our sin to God.

B. Answer for our sin (1 John 1:9)

- Repentant heart, genuinely sorry for offending God, should accompany confession of sin.
- The assurance of God's forgiveness is based on two things:

1. – God's Faithfulness

- **a.** The Bible is full of God's promises to forgive the sin of anyone who comes to Him with a repentant heart and asks for it. (**Romans 10:13**)
- **b.** God is faithful and will always do what He said He will do.
- c. When we sin and then confess, God is faithful to forgive because He said He would.

2. – Justice

- **a.** The second reason God will forgive our sin is His justice.
- **b.** The Bible states that God's just judgment against sin must be paid.
- **c.** The good news is the debt has been paid by Jesus on the cross of Calvary.
- **d.** God accepted the sacrifice of Jesus on our behalf.

C. Calling God a liar

1. Anyone who claims they have no sin is calling God a liar. (1 John 1:10)

- **2.** If we deny our inherent sin nature, our acts of sin, or our responsibility for our sin, we call God a liar.
- 3. All of God's dealings with man since Adam's fall in the garden have been about sin.
- The creation of Israel, The incarnation of Jesus, The death, burial, & resurrection of Jesus, & the church and the proclamation of the gospel.
- **4.** All was done by God to reconcile sinful man to Himself.

D. Message to the lost

- **1.** The message to the lost is one of great opportunity.
- 2. We are all sinners because we fall short of God's perfect holiness.
- 3. If you have ever been less than perfect in any area of life you are a sinner.
- **4.** If you have ever failed to obey God's law perfectly you are a sinner.
- **5.** Good News: The good news is Jesus forgives sinners!
- **6.** If you'll confess your sin to Him, admit that you're a sinner, & ask for His forgiveness, Jesus will forgive you completely past, present, and future, forever.
- 7. Jesus will give you eternal life & the Holy Spirit will baptize you into God's family.

III. Our Advocate (1 John 2:1-2)

A. That you may not sin

- **1.** John wrote this letter to his children in the faith that they might not sin.
- 2. There's a danger for Christians who know they are saved to begin to take sin lightly.
- 3. It is the idea of turning God's grace into a license to sin.
- **4.** However, opposite's true, because we're saved we should never think lightly of sin.
- **5.** Being saved brings with it two inherent principles:

(1) – Obedience to God

- **a.** Having personal knowledge & a relationship with God brings an obligation to obey His commands. Knowledge brings with it responsibility.
- **b.** God commands us to be holy because He is holy.

(2) – Emulate Jesus

- **a.** The Holy Spirit is continually conforming us to the image of Jesus.
- **b.** Those saved should live like Jesus did which was in perfect obedience to the Father.
- **c.** We'll never achieve sinless perfection in this sinful body, but it should be our goal.

B. We have an advocate.

- 1. When we do sin we have an Advocate with the Father. Our Advocate is Jesus.
- **2.** Word for "Advocate" in this verse is Greek word *parakletos* meaning one who comes alongside to help us. As our Advocate, Jesus is our helper who comes to our defense.
- **3.** When we sin Jesus is our friend in heaven's court. He declares our innocence based on His shed blood.

C. Jesus is our propitiation

- **1.** Greek word for "propitiation" is *hilasmos* meaning to satisfy judgment against our sin.
- 2. Jesus paid the price for our sin on the cross thus God can forgive us and remain just.
- **3.** Jesus is both our Advocate and the one who paid for our sin.
- **4.** The blood of Jesus is sufficient to satisfy the wrath of the Father against all sin.

D. The truth about sin

- 1. It separates us from God and the penalty is eternal punishment in the lake of fire.
- 2. Jesus paid for our sin by His shed blood.
